

## **Sports Grant**

### **Breakdown of spends between Sept 2015 – Sept 2016**

At St Vincent de Paul we recognise the contribution of PE to the health and well-being of the children. We believe that an innovative, varied PE curriculum and extracurricular opportunities have a positive influence on the concentration, attitude and academic achievement of all our children. Physical education and sport clearly contribute to the holistic development of young people and through participation in sport and physical education, the children learn more about key values such as teamwork, fair play and respect for themselves and others. There is significant evidence to show the positive effects of sport and exercise on children's physical health, growth and development. Furthermore, sport also provides a healthy environment for young people to learn how to deal with competition and how to cope with both winning and losing.

**In 2015 we achieved the Silver Sainsbury's School Games Mark, a nationwide scheme which rewards schools for their commitment to and development of competition, school sport and physical education. We only missed out on the Gold award by once category, which we hope to achieve by next year.**



### **Members of Stevenage Sporting Futures**

Outdoor play equipment	£2,610	The outdoor play equipment was introduced to provide children throughout the school with greater opportunities to participate in an activity during their break time. The children cooperated on the design of the apparatus they wanted and participated in the rules and regulations regarding its use. The apparatus is a great source of enjoyment and challenge to all children. Additional equipment for use in the playground has been purchased to provide a greater range of activities for the children to participate in. The EYFS equipment provides appropriate physical challenge for the children and also requires them to develop their social skills. Sports kits have been purchased because of increased number of children participating in school competition. It gives them a sense of pride in their school and the recognition of being part of a team.
