Summer Catch Up?

I know that many of you have been asking questions about what will happen over the summer and what September will look like for your children. There has been much talk of 'catch up' which has not been particularly helpful at this stage – a Summer of catch-up would be neither useful nor effective as everyone needs the space to enjoy their families (teachers and children) without worries and fears about falling behind. Late this afternoon, the Government sent schools notice of its outline plans for a national 'catch up' programme, which will be funded centrally for the following year. We have not been consulted on what might help schools in this task and do not currently have any further details. I know that you will understand that we will be working to ensure that we meet your child(ren)'s needs wherever they are as we always do when we return in September, regardless of the 'catch up' plan. We also look forward to reaping some of the benefits, new skill and interests that you will have developed with your children during this time. We mustn't allow the current rhetoric to negate the great things that have also been happening. As I have said on many occasions, our teachers are very skilled at this and you can trust that, along with their emotional and spiritual wellbeing, this will remain a priority as we all want the very best for them.

Plans for September

In terms of what September will look like, this is hard to predict. However, if the guidance allows it, we will be aiming to get all children back into school as soon as we can. As unbelievable as it may seem, we only get to hear the details of the future plans at the same time as they are released by the Government to all (or when leaked to the press): **contrary to popular belief, we are given no prior notice**. Although we have been working on a number of different scenarios (just in case), we cannot let you know anything about September until the government have made their decisions.









Capital Projects

You will have seen that contractors have been working on site this week. This has been a challenge but has been managed so that the school Covid Risk Assessment is not compromised. It is a strange time for us to be having work done; however, if work didn't start quickly, we would have lost the 90% government funding for this £200K project which we have been bidding for over a number of years. The project will completely renew the hot and cold water distribution system throughout the school and as such new pipework has to be traced through all areas. This will cause us some disruption – next week Bubbles 6 & 7 will be temporarily moving into the KS2 building whilst work is completed in their classrooms. The children visited their new classrooms today and were very excited, feeling very grown up to be in the juniors already! If you have children in these bubbles, you will have been sent instructions about changes to drop off and collection locations earlier today. Changes for other bubbles currently located in the KS1 building are likely in the weeks ahead. Please keep checking your Parent Mails.

Whilst we consider building projects – exciting plans are still underway for a dining room revamp as well as freshening up of the main office reception area and an exciting transformation of the chimney at the main entrance! We'll have a new look in September!
