DEFINITIONS OF COVID-19 SYMPTOMS

A NEW CONTINUOUS COUGH

A NEW CONTINUOUS COUGH MEANS:

• you are coughing a lot for more than 1 hour

OR

- you have been coughing a lot 3 or more times in 24 hours
- if you normally have a cough, it may be worse than usual.





The coronavirus cough is a dry cough. This means it does not produce any phlegm or mucus (so you do not cough anything up like you would with a chesty cough).

If you have a chest condition you may already cough. If you have symptoms of coronavirus, you may have a cough that is different from your normal cough, or your normal cough may feel worse than usual.



A HIGH TEMPERATURE OR FEVER

A high temperature or fever is a normal way for your body to fight infection.

This is because the increase in body temperature makes it harder for viruses and bacteria to survive.



You do not need to take your temperature to know you have a fever.

If you do have a thermometer however, a fever is when your temperature is 37.8C or higher.

ACCESSING A COVID TEST

What to do if your child or anyone in your household develop symptoms

- Get a test as soon as possible
- The household should stay at home (isolate) and have no visitors until you get your test result only leave home to have a test. If you cannot get a test the family will need to isolate for 14 days (the individual with symptoms for 10 days).

How to access testing

We appreciate that it has been incredibly difficult to book a Covid test. You will need to be persistent. If you cannot book a test and your child or a household member is symptomatic you are required to isolate for the full period.

Test Sites

- To book a test, use the following internet link: <u>https://self-refferal.test-for-coronavirus.service.gov.uk/antigen/name</u>
- If you have difficulties booking an appointment, appointments are refreshed for the following morning at 8pm in the evening and at 10am in the morning for the same day. Other appointments may be added throughout the day. Check the site regularly until you are successful.

Home tests

- Home tests can be ordered if you are unable to access a testing site
- Home test are ordered in the same way as booking an appointment for a test using the link above
- It is important that kits are posted to the address given via ROYAL MAIL PRIORITY MAILBOX so that they are prioritised by Royal Mail to go to testing labs

School test kits

All schools have been provided with a small number of postal test kits and we are only permitted to offer these in the **exceptional circumstances** listed below:

The pupil has developed symptoms whilst at school and:

- The school believes they may have significant barriers to accessing a test elsewhere; or
- The school believes that if the child was sent home without at a test kit, they would not receive a test at all.

We are not permitted to conduct coronavirus tests on site or assist with the testing.

A member of staff, however, has been trained in the protocols and procedures relating to them and can advise as required.

<u>Test results</u>

Test results will be returned via email or text directly to you.

Negative result:

- Should the test come back negative, your child can return to school immediately as long as they are no longer unwell (including no longer displaying symptoms, although a cough or the change to taste / smell may linger).
- If they remain unwell keep them at home until they are better, as usual
- Please forward the email you receive indicating a negative result to <u>admin@stvincent.herts.sch.uk</u>
- Your child must not return to school until the school has authorised this (please call or email).

Positive result:

- Let the school know immediately. If it is out of school hours or over the weekend please email head@stvincent.herts.sch.uk as this email is monitored regularly.
- The person that has tested positive must isolate for 10 days
- The rest of the household must isolate for 14 days
- You will need to engage with NHS Track and Trace
- The school will engage with the regional department of Public Health England for advice

If any member of your household has tested positive the school also needs to be informed promptly.

What would happen if a child or staff member tested positive?

Should a child or staff member test positive, the school would be required to send home any person that has been in close contact with them.

Close contact is currently defined as:

- Direct close contact face-to-face contact with an infected individual for any length of time, within 1 metre, including being coughed on, a face-to-face conversation, or unprotected physical contact (skin-to-skin)
- Proximity contacts extended close contact (within 1 to 2 metres for more than 15 minutes) with an infected individual
- Travelling in a small vehicle, like a car, with an infected person

School would seek definitive advice from our local health protection team about this.

Bubbles (year groups) may need to close for a period of 14 days, upon the direction of the local Public Health Team, in relation to incidences of positive testing.
